LUkraine asbl (R.C.S Luxembourg F 9.931) is a Luxembourg-based nonprofit that **unites** the Ukrainian Community in Grand Duchy of Luxembourg to increase awareness about Ukraine in Luxembourg and contribute to the humanitarian crisis relief in Ukraine.

Our association was founded in 2014 following the spirit of the Revolution of Dignity in Ukraine and continued to act amid the ongoing war from that year, focusing on

- saving lives
- direct involvement with the community
- social and cultural integration

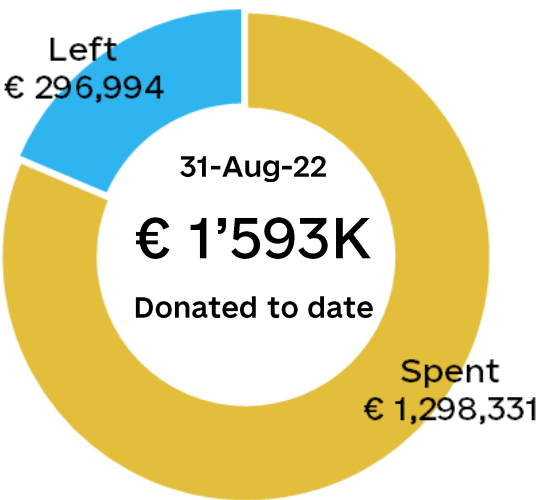

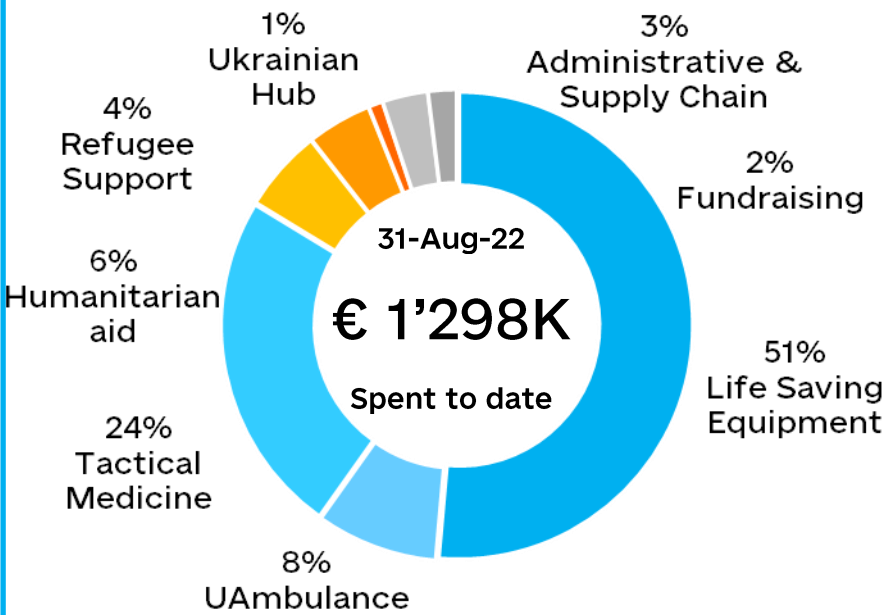

Medical Aid



- **10 ambulances** have been sent to East and South of Ukraine
- **44 pallets** of medicine and medical equipment delivered to Ukrainian hospitals

Humanitarian Aid



- **770 tons = 604 pallets** of non-perishable food, hygiene products, children's items and pet food were shipped and distributed among internally displaced people in Ukraine

Tactical Medicine



- **over €200,000** spent on hemostatic agents and bandages
- **465 persons** participated in “Tourniquets in First Aid” training in Lviv

Food Packages



- **13'000 food packages** were distributed in Ukraine in cooperation with IAHU

Tactical Medicine



Under the conditions of martial law in the country, you should be ready for anything, even if you are a civilian. Simple things save lives - a clear understanding of the sequence of actions helps to take control in an emergency and provide first aid to the victim.

465 first responders, doctors, border guards, policemen, rangers, territorial defense forces had taken a course “Tactical medicine for Ukrainians” held in Lviv and Striy in April-May 2022.

“The main causes of death for 80-90% of the wounded at the battlefield are massive blood loss and shock. Injuries that occur in modern armed conflicts significantly limit the time of providing first aid. Death occurs from several tens of seconds to one hour. However, if at least 60% of the battalion’s personnel know how to provide first aid, the chances of survival of the wounded increase dramatically.” – noted Andrew Cambier, an instructor from Luxembourg.



During the training, every participant had a chance to learn how to use tourniquet and bandage, as well as other first aid techniques.

This course became possible thanks to IAHU, LUKriane asbl, Internationa-PMC, Razom and Lviv Regional Military Administration.

UAmbulance

LUkraine asbl reaches a milestone in UAmbulance project

sending 10 equipped vehicles to Ukraine.



Since April, LUkraine has raised €130,000 of necessary funds for the purchase and restoration of the ambulances in this project.

On April 18th, the first car was sent to the town of Novomoskovsk in the Dnipro region undergoing heavy attacks from the aggressor. This marked the initiation of what would be a total of 10 vehicles scouted from different parts of Europe and brought to functioning conditions by a team in Luxembourg. Missing equipment, registration matters, and technical inspections were taken care of for the ambulances to be able to provide uninterrupted and efficient medical help.

“In LUkraine we see it as a superior goal to help Ukrainian people and save lives. In this project, we know that these vehicles will save many lives. This is the minimum contribution we could do in order to support the people in their daily struggle with aggression and anxiety.” – says Eddie Berkovitch, leader of UAmbulance project.

In addition to repairment of the ambulances, humanitarian aid in the form of bandages, medical kits, antiseptics, and burn aids, was gathered and sent along with the vehicles to hospitals undergoing dire shortages of such materials.

Five months later, August 5th marked the departure of the 10th ambulance on its way to Ukraine, sent to the town of Nikopol.



Over the period from April to August and thanks to the help of SNCA, SNCT, Autopolis Utilitaire, Lalux and TÜV, Rheinland Luxembourg, as well as support from Ievgenii Smoliak and Chen Kim, among other volunteers from both sides, the ambulances have been able to provide crucial life-saving medical help in towns of the regions of Dnipro, Mykolaiv, Kharkiv, and Chernihiv.

Family assistance



- **over 1'000 (20%)** refugees matched with hosts and accommodated
- 2 humanitarian distribution centers with essential supplies and furniture

Information Support



- 3'000 of arrived refugees were covered with information support
- 150 refugee benefit from free sport activities

Psychological Support



- 280 sessions conducted to help 96 refugees
- 6 psychotherapists employed

Integration



- **almost 500** refugees covered by language courses
 - **over 400** CVs processed
 - **over 160** people attended job seeking webinars

Library



- 1500 Ukrainian books offered
- 170+ readers visit library
- Ukrainian speaking club meets on premises

Mriya Kids



- Easter Camp – 30 kids covered
- Saturday spring workshops – 40 kids enjoyed classes
- Super-U summer camp – 135 kids engaged in 3 shifts

Psychological Support

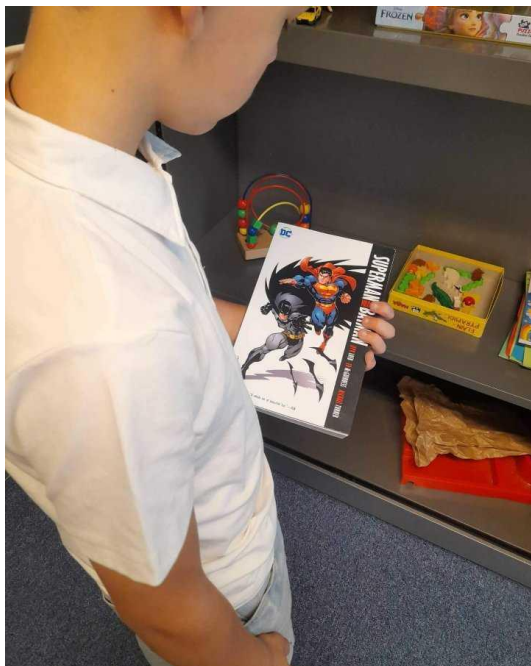


Psychological trauma or PTSD among refugees is a real and pressing concern. A recent WHO review of mental disorders in war-affected populations found an average PTSD rate of 15.3%, far higher than in populations unaffected by armed conflict.

Chronic stress and the breakdown of protective networks make refugees, particularly children, vulnerable to the impacts of trauma, poor health, economic and life outcomes. Unfortunately, refugees' stories don't end when they escape - violence and humanitarian crises take huge tolls on people's mental health.

As the war continues, the opportunity for Ukrainians to return home decreases and the need for stability in their new country increases, thus support for Ukrainian refugees is shifting from immediate necessities like food and shelter to health, housing, and job support.

In a non-traditional method of support, LUkraine has created a mental health program for Ukrainians, by Ukrainians.



Psychological Support Project had started in late May'22, featuring partnership with Doctena.lu and six Ukrainian therapists led by Kristina Goncharik.

Since then, over 280 psychological support sessions were held helping 95 adults, teenagers and little kids to get their lives back on track and start caring about themselves.

“Super-U” Summer Camp

LUkraine asbl opened summer camp for refugee children in Leudelange

The camp will run daily from 09:30 to 17:00. About 145 children will participate in summer activities and learn about Luxembourg

“I believe that there is no better way to spend the summer than to be with your peers: learn to make new friends, to win and lose, to support, ultimately to discover new hobbies and talents.

We named our camp “Super-U” because we strongly believe that every little kid is a superhero with their own superpowers and we, adults, simply need to give them a cape and a little help,” – says camp leader Elena Berkovitch, who inspired LUkraine to open Mriya Kids project and successfully runs it.



For a month and a half, from mid July till the end of August 2022, scout chalet “Schwengswee” in Leudelange became a happy place for 135 refugee kids who fled the war in Ukraine.

These children, of different age and backgrounds, from different regions of Ukraine, were embracing a peaceful moments, without sirens of aerial threat, bomb shelters and fear.

A trip to the animal park



Camp was operating full day, with two snacks and hot lunch kindly donated by Sodexo, featuring Philippe Nicolet.

On top of entertainment and providing a safe place for the kids, we aimed to give them some knowledge about the host country – its culture and history, symbols and holidays, ecology and recycling, volunteering and scouting, etc.

We are thankful to Leudelange municipality and namely Alex Ganzen, for offering us this amazing space, and to all the camp volunteers who made this experience unforgettable.
